but if we define

$$Y_i^{\text{new}} = \ln Y_i$$

$$X_i^{\text{new}} = \ln X_i$$

$$Y_i^{\text{new}} = \ln \beta_1 + \beta_2 X_i^{\text{new}} + \mu_i$$

Then, it is linear in variables.

1.5 linear in parameters but not in variable

Since X^{-1} (with power -1)

Linear regression

$$\textcircled{1} \quad Y_i = \frac{1}{\beta_1 + \beta_2 X_i}$$

$$\beta_1 Y_i + \beta_2 X_i Y_i = 1$$

$$\therefore \frac{1}{Y_i} = \beta_1 + \beta_2 X_i$$

$\therefore$ It is linear in parameters $\rightarrow$ linear regression model.

$$\textcircled{2} \quad Y_i = \frac{X_i}{\beta_1 + \beta_2 X_i}$$

$$\beta_1 Y_i + \beta_2 X_i Y_i = X_i$$

$$\frac{X_i}{Y_i} = \beta_1 + \beta_2 X_i$$

$\therefore$ It is linear in parameters $\rightarrow$ linear regression model.

$$\textcircled{3} \quad Y_i + Y_i \exp(-\beta_1 - \beta_2 X_i) = 1$$

$$\frac{1 - Y_i}{Y_i} = \exp(-\beta_1 - \beta_2 X_i)$$

$$\ln \left[\frac{1 - Y_i}{Y_i} \right] = -\beta_1 - \beta_2 X_i$$

$\therefore$ It is linear in parameters $\rightarrow$ linear regression model.
